


Lidcombe Bowling Club

Celebrating 75 Years 11th June 1936 – 11th June 2011







Bowls is a science, the study of a lifetime, in which you may exhaust yourself but never your subject.

It is a contest, a duel calling for courage, skill, strategy and self-control.

It is a test of temper, a trial of honour, a revealer of character.

It affords the chance to play the man and act the gentleman.

It means going into God's out-of-doors, getting close to nature, fresh air, exercise.

A sweeping away of mental cobwebs, genuine reaction of tired tissues.

It is a cure for care, an antidote to worry. It includes companionship with friends, social intercourse, opportunities for courtesy, kindliness and generosity to an opponent.

It promotes not only physical health but also moral force.



Bowls historians believe that the game developed from the Egyptians. One of their pastimes was to play skittles with round stones. This has been determined based on artefacts found in tembs dating circa 5,000 B.C. The sport spread across the world and took a variety of forms, Bocce (Italian), Bolla (Saxon), Bolle (Danish), Boules (French) and Ula Miaka (Polynesian).


Lawn bowling was a game played by Roman Soldiers, in which stones were tossed towards a target stone with the object of getting as close to the target as possible. Roman legions introduced the game to countries throughout the empire. Over time, the stones were replaced by balls that were usually rolled, rather than thrown. In France, the sport became known as *boules*, from the Latin word for ball, and the English word *bowl* came from that French root.

It's believed that the "bias" was introduced inadvertently in 1522 by the Duke of Suffolk. Apparently his bowl split in two after striking other bowls and he took a knob off of a stairway banister post for a replacement. The flat side of the knob caused it to roll with a bias and he experimented by curving his bowl around others. The word spread and bias bowls gradually came into use.

Certainly the most famous story in lawn bowls is about Sir Francis Drake and the Spanish Armada. On July 19, 1588, Drake was involved in a game at Plymouth when he was notified that the Spanish Armada had been sighted. The tale says his response was, "There is plenty of time to win the game and thrash the Spaniards too." He then proceeded to finish his match and the British Navy soundly defeated the Armada.

Henry VIII was also a lawn bowler. However, he banned the game for those who were not wealthy or "well to do" because "Bowyes, Fletchers, Stringers and Arrowhead makers" were spending more time at recreational events such as bowls instead of practicing their trade. Henry requested that anybody who wished to keep a green pay a fee of 100 pounds. However, the green could only be used for private play and he forbade anyone to "play at any bowle or bowls in open space out of his own garden or orchard."


Such bans soon passed with the use of firearms and the declining importance of archery in warfare, but the Puritan revolution virtually ended all sports in England, and lawn bowling didn't make much of a comeback even the Restoration of 1660.

The sport flourished in Scotland, however, and the Scots during the 1840's developed a set of standardised rules that have been changed very little. Despite the sport's antiquity, there was no central ruling body in England until 1903, when the English Lawn Bowling Association (EBA) was founded.

In 1864 William Wallace Mitchell (1803–1884), a Glasgow Cotton Merchant, published his "Manual of Bowls Playing" which became the basis of the rules of the modern game.

National Bowling Associations were established in the late 1800s. The Royal New South Wales Bowling association and the Royal Victorian Bowling Association were both formed in 1880. The Scottish Bowling Association was established in 1892, although there had been a failed attempt in 1848 by 200 Scottish clubs.

Today the sport is played in over 40 countries with more than 50 member national authorities. The home of the modern game is still Scotland with the World Bowls centre in Edinburgh.




It was in June 1936, as the economic conditions were starting to recover that a public meeting was called in the Lidcombe Town Hall and a committee was formed comprising the Hon. JT Lang MLA., the Hon. JH Gander, MHR., the Hon. SA Lloyd, MLA., CW Phillips, J Cronin, GL Gamble, AR McVicar, MT Guildfoyle, GN Shirt, F Wilson, EA Wyatt and J. Littlejohn.

These men gave their time and effort to form the Lidcombe Bowling club. The original green consisting of 6 rinks was built mainly by relief workers, and materials and filling was carted in drays provided by CW Phillips. Total cost was £1348.6.1. CW Phillips was elected Foundation President. An old Army hut was erected adjacent to the eastern end of the Lidcombe RSL Club. This served as a Clubhouse for the following seventeen years when the basic structure of the Clubhouse as we know it today was opened by Mr. W Carson, President of the Royal NSW Bowling Association in 1953.

During the life of the Lidcombe Bowling Club we have been fortunate to have many of our members as prominent Civic fathers with many well known parks and streets named after them. It would be remiss in compiling this resume if it failed to list some of those members whose names have been perpetuated on the Board of Honour in Council Chambers, Hospitals, and various Clubs throughout the district - N Wyatt, F Wilson, E Norman, A McVicar C Phillips, H Brown, P McLaughlin and T Keegan.

In 1963, the Lidcombe Ladies Bowling Club was formed and Mona Cooper was installed as Foundation President. The Ladies have added a change to the general atmosphere, both inside and out on the green, especially when we look back on the days when it was a men's domain and we played three teams home and three teams away (and no trophies), and the players retired to the Clubhouse for afternoon tea complete with silver candelabra, comprising fresh scones, jam and fresh cream provided by Miss Fell.

Sometime in 1976 a government edict required the various clubs to be formed into a Company; and this required the rewriting of the Constitution and often altering, adding to and deleting and with many "Special" meetings the new Constitution was acceptable to the Licensing Court and the Club became a Company in December, 1982. It was about this time the Club's western boundary was established and the portion of the park was purchased from the Council for the recreation and enjoyment of the citizens of the community.



On behalf of Bowls NSW I take great pleasure in congratulating the Lidcombe Bowling Club Ltd on surviving for 75 years since its foundation on this day in 1936 and I look forward with much anticipation on attending at the club on this auspicious occasion to join in with members for the 75th Anniversary celebrations.

Over all these years the Lidcombe Bowling Club has proven to be a valuable asset to the local community in providing a much needed and vital sporting and social venue for the local area which no doubt the generations of residents and bowlers alike certainly would have appreciated.

There would be little doubt that during the past 75 years the Club would have faced many challenges including having to combat opposition larger licensed premises in the area. However, due to the diligence and dedication of the Club's Boards both past and present it has continued to survive and provide much needed facilities to the local community. It has also experienced success on the greens over the years and a number of well accomplished bowlers have tasted success whilst at the Lidcombe Club.

As we are well aware the Club Industry is facing probably its greatest challenge in many years with the Federal Government's proposed gaming machine legislation and Lidcombe will be no exception as the clubs fight for their very survival. However I am confident that if the Club Board exhibits the same dedication and zeal that has been evident in the past then I am sure that the club will survive to provide the same valuable service to the community as it has done for the past 75 years.

Best wishes and good luck go to the Club, its Board and the Members and hopefully everyone will enjoy what should be a marvelous day in the club's proud history.

I joined Lidcombe Bowling Club a mere 16 years ago, just before we celebrated our 60th Anniversary, and my, how bowls has changed in that time and how our club has also changed in that time.

16 years ago, we all wore white shirts and creams, which is still the image that most outsiders have of our sport today. We got our first "coloured" shirts in 1997. Those shirts were still essentially white, but with blue and gold piping on the sleeves and pocket. The shirts being worn in the above picture are our third generation shirts. This year, we have also made the change to blue pants for our pennant players. The change to coloured bowls is another great change that has occurred over the past 16 years. Then, bowls were like Model T Fords – you could have any colour as long as it was black. Today, less than 25% of our pennant players have black bowls.

We have seen similar changes in our Club over those 16 years as well. I was looking at a video of a function held in the club some 10 years ago, and the club is unrecognizable from those days. From the old "wood veneer" panels (the only remnant of that design is around the pool table), green carpet, wood veneer tables and red chairs, we now have a bright, modern club with new furniture and a nice carpet. Our club is now a place where people are happy to come and socialize.

Our club has changed a lot over the past years, and we must continue to change if we are to survive into the future. So many clubs around us have disappeared over the years, with many other clubs only surviving after being taken over. We are part of a dying breed – the small independent club, and we owe our success to the many members over the years who have donated so much time and energy in support of our club. I thank you all, and I am proud to have been your President in this, our 75th year.

Over the years, the achievements have been many, winning their sections in all grades. 2010 was our greatest result as we made the State Play-off in grade 3, coming 4th in the State.






